Message from the Chairman of the Board and Director

On behalf of the Liepaja Jewish Heritage Foundation ("Liepājas ebreju mantojums") we are pleased to present our 2021 Annual Report which provides a summary of our initiatives and activities.

- 1. We began the year hopeful that the unusual challenges presented in 2020 by the global pandemic would soon be in the rearview mirror. However, the reality of 2021 forced us adapt to the ongoing pandemic conditions.
- 2. While the Community has not been immune to these difficulties we have seen a resilience in the individuals that constitute our members to become considerate of each other and to appreciate every opportunity to meet in person.
- 3. The Liepaja Jewish Heritage Foundation was forced rethink how to improve and mobilize our work to ensure the continuation of projects, programs, social services and funding.
- 4. We worked side by side with the Liepaja Jewish Community Board.
- 5. One of our tasks was to enrich life of the Jewish Community members, their families and children and provide educational, cultural, and social assistance.
- 6. Permanent social assistance arranged by the Uniting History Foundation has improved the lives of Community members in need and families affected most by this pandemic.
- 7. We launched new initiatives, as well as assisted with Jewish family research, assisting many people of the Jewish origin to find their roots and become members of the Liepaja Jewish Community. 19 new members joined the Community between 2019 -2021.
- 8. Through Jewish heritage research, education and Holocaust Remembrance Jewish values, goals, traditions and connections are being preserved for current and future generations.
- 9. During the year of 2021 we maintained contact with the descendants of Liepaja/Libau Jews from many countries worldwide and continued with the initiative to meet in 2022 at the World Reunion of Liepaja/Libau Jewry.
- 10. Thinking ahead, post-pandemic, we consider that among our tasks, the following should feature in relation to the Liepaja Jewish Community sustainability and engagement:
 - attract new members to the Community by assisting them with the Jewish roots research program;
 - help the Jewish Community of Liepaja to develop as an open, connected, and vibrant Jewish peoplehood that cares for each other, fosters Jewish learning, traditions and its heritage, and acts as a focal point of good deeds to the wider world;
 - ensure families with young children connect with each other and with Jewish life in innovative and engaging ways.

George Schwab – 90

There are not many Liepaja Jewish Survivors still living. George Schwab is one of them and is still active, motivating and supporting initiatives of the Liepaja Jewish Heritage Foundation including Holocaust studies, Jewish traditions and the Jewish heritage of Liepaja.

George Schwab, a founding member of the Liepaja Jewish Heritage Foundation, and an active participant of all our projects marked his 90th anniversary on 25 November 2021 "Mazel Tov!".

We surprised George with an online meeting to congratulate him on this significant date and send our appreciation to him for all his activity, his life to record our respect for him.





One of our highlights in 2021 was the launch of the photobook **Liepāja Либава Libau** which work started in 2018.

The photobook is available in Latvian, English, Russian and German.

It contains 258 photographs of Liepaja taken by several photographers before WWII. These pictures guide us through pre-War Liepaja, a city of endless charm and warmth, with its long beach of white sand, the movie houses, the museum, the opera house that doubled as a theater, the hotels, cafes, shops, and the beautifully maintained parks.

It is dedicated to the people of Liepaja (Liepājnieki), who have built and developed their hometown, our hometown, for the benefit of the present and future generations.

The Liepaja Jewish Heritage Foundation activities in 2021 focused on the 80th anniversary of the outbreak of WWII and the Holocaust in Latvia and the mass extermination of Liepaja Jews.

1.	Liepaja Jewish Heritage
1.2.	We started a weekly, free on-line thematic lecture cycle. The main goal of these lectures was to provide information about Jewish heritage of Liepāja. It included unknown Holocaust facts; general information about the development of the city and the huge contribution of Jews to its economy, construction, culture, sports, education including the influence of the Jewish community on all aspects of the city's life during the period from the beginning of the 18th century to the outbreak of World War II. We held 26 Zoom meetings. More than 57 guests participated not only from the Liepāja Jewish Community, but also Liepāja guides,
	academics and Liepāja descendants from Riga, Moscow, Israel, Germany and the USA.
1.3.	George Scwab, Ivar Brod, Eli Valk, Ilya Lensky from Museum Jews in Latvia, Maija Meijere Oše, from Ž. Lipke Memorial Museum in Riga were our guest speakers. We were welcomed by Arkadij Suharenko, the President of the Council of Jewish Communities of Latvia, who welcomed online conference participants on Hanukkah.

VII.	ONGOING PROJECTS	
1.	The Jewish cemetery	
	According to the Jewish cemetery register books there are 3564 names. The last death recorded was on 21 June 1941. There are unique and valuable collections of sepulchral art. 90% of burials have no descendants due to the Holocaust, and a few arrive in Liepaja from time to time to	

then repair, restore or erect a new

	gravestone.
1.	Together with the Uniting History Foundation we provide regular clean-up of the cemetery. This work is complicated due to old fences surrounding many of the gravestones. This work is attended to almost the whole year round.
2.	We commenced a global research of burials, analyzing monuments and special gravestones from an historical and architectural point of view. Our intention is to obtain a special status for the old part of the Jewish cemetery from the State authorities. We intend to apply for the status of "historical cultural heritage of the Jewish minority of Latvia".
3.	We found 4 burials of Liepaja Rabbis that are in a bad condition. We undertook some preservation works to minimize further destruction of them.
4.	When digitalization of cemeteries in Latvia started we found that according to the new plan of burials Sector A was missing with many of the burials not recorded from previous years. We carried out an inventory of this sector and have evidence of the gradual disappearance of Jewish burials in sector A. As soon as the pandemic restrictions are eased we shall meet the city authorities from the City Cemetery department.
2	Šķēde Memorial Complex
1.	In 2021 we undertook the clean-up of the Šķēde Memorial area. We restored the road surface to the Memorial and the parking lot, as over the past 15 years the open-hearth surface which had eroded.
2.	Before special commemoration events extra work was organized to clean and wash all stone parts of the Memorials.
3	Because of the danger of the sea coast erosion, the Šķēde Memorial is threatened. The City authorities have decided to construct a boom (groin) into the sea which should shore up the coastline. In autumn we ceased the cleaning works, except for collecting garbage. In December a big clean-up activity took place before the commemoration events dedicated to the 80th anniversary of extermination of Jews in Šķēde.

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
